

HATVALA MAJOR TEA REGIONS OF VIETNAM



HA GIANG

Ha Giang Province is located in the northern mountainous tea growing area and shares a 270 km border with Yunnan province of southern China.

Ha Giang is the home to wild tea trees which grow at altitudes of 1200 to 1600 metres at places such as Cao Bo and Lung Pin.

Hatvala offers both green and pho nhi (pu-erh in Chinese) teas from Ha Giang.



THAI NGUYEN

Thai Nguyen Province sits between the Red River delta and the northern mountains. It is known as the centre of Vietnamese tea production.

The commune of Tan Cuong is one of the most sought after places in Thai Nguyen's for tea due to its unique climate and soil.

Hatvala offers a quality Tan Cuong green tea and also uses Tan Cuong tea as a base for its jasmine and pomelo teas.



YEN BAI

Yen Bai Province forms part of Vietnam's northern mountainous tea growing region located between Hanoi and the China border.

The town of Suoi Giang at 1200 metres above sea level is famous for its wild tea trees that grow on the misty mountainside and are harvested by H'Mong minority hill people.

Hatvala offers full of character green, white and black wild teas from Yen Bai.



SON LA

Son La is another province located in the northern mountainous tea growing region. Son La shares a border with Laos to the south.

The area around the Moc Chau plateau is renowned for its agriculture and wild flowers. Tea is grown in plantations here and much of the output is used to produce oolong tea for export.

Hatvala offers two exceptional oolong teas from Moc Chau.



LAM DONG

Lam Dong province is an important centre of agriculture in Vietnam's central highlands famous for its coffee, tea and vegetables.

The areas around Cao Dat and Bao Loc are the best known for tea production and focus on oolong teas for export to Taiwan. Bao Loc uses the registered B'lao tea trademark.

Hatvala does not yet offer any teas from Lam Dong but continues to seek out teas that meet our requirements.
